Shah Faridoon—The First Great Spiritual Healer

After a long golden period under Shah Jamsheed, Iran came under the rule of the evil Zohak. Zohak or Azhi dahaka was a tyrant who unleashed an era of terror and oppression. He murdered Shah Jamsheed and ordered human sacrifices. In the Avesta he is called "Baevare -aspa (possessing the strength of 10,000 horses). He was the living embodiment of evil and the ten vices that afflict humanity.

Faridoon ("one possessing the wisdom of the 8th sky") was born to Athwiyan and Franak during these troubled times. When evil Zohak murdered Athwiyan, Faridoon's mother Franak took the little boy to a secluded place in Alburz mountains and entrusted the child in the care of 'Purmayaah' the spiritual cow who nursed the child for three years. In the meantime, astrologers began to predict that the young lad named Faridoon would soon slay the evil Zohak.

The first to rise in rebellion against Zohak was a blacksmith named Kawa. He made a war standard out of his leather apron and collected an army under "Drafshi-i-Kawayani" (the flag of Kawa).

Kawa sought out Faridoon and encouraged him to liberate Iran from the yoke of Zohak's evil rule. Faridoon with the aid of Sarosh Yazata was successful in overthrow Zohak. Under the guidance of Sarosh Yazata, Faridoon did not kill Zohak (since the time had not come in Nature to do that), instead he tied the evil one on Mount Daemavand. The day this event took place was Roj Meher of Mah Meher. Thus was laid the foundation of the festival of "Meherangan" or the day when good triumphed over evil and the pious Faridoon liberated the land of Iran from oppression and tyranny.

According to legend, Zohak who was the living embodiment of evil is still chained to that great spiritual mountain, Daemavand. It is said every night when the forces of evil gain strength the chains weaken. However at the crack of dawn when the cock crows and the sun comes out the chains are again secured and the evil one is rendered powerless. This is an important truth in nature wrapped in an easy-to understand legend. This is the reason why we pray in the "Afreen-i-haft Ameshaspandan": "Hamazor Daemavand koh ke dravand Bivarasp andar oye basta ested." (Be in accord/attuned with Daemavand Koh (mountain) (which has the power and) in which is enchained the demon - Bivarasp, the demon (with power) of ten thousand horses".

Shah Faridoon is also recognised in Zarathushtrian tradition as a Master Healer. He is said to have known all sorts of holy incantations (nirangs) with which he could change his form at will as also heal various afflictions. Even today many of the "nirangs" which we pray are ascribed to Faridoon Padshah. Faridoon was a saintly monarch who ruled with benevolence and re-established during his reign of 500 years an era of virtue, happiness and prosperity.

Shah Faridoon had been blessed by Sarosh Yazata with the power to neutralize all forms of evil whether in the form of disease, human vices or an evil energy at a metaphysical level. In the Fravardin Yasht we invoke his righteous fravashi in order to withstand various diseases: 'Thrnotnonahe Athuynnoish ashaono Iravashim yazamaide'. We also pray in the Vanant Yasht: 'Baeshaza goafringan bad. Name Ahura Mazda pa name niv khoreh Faridoon Faridoon Athavyan' "(May there be health and fame!) Through the name of Ahura Mazda and through the name and the power and glory of Faridoon the son of Athavyan".

It is considered very efficacious to remember the name of Shah Faridoon and invoke his pious fravashi for spiritual assistance during prolonged illness or whenever one feel afflicted by various forms of evil. His fravashi may also be invoked for spiritual assistance in controlling personal weaknesses such as the demon of wrath, greed, envy, lust, etc.

We would like to introduce our newest Navar, Er. Bakhtiyar Engineer, son of Zubin and Shernaz Engineer and brother of Kaizad Engineer. Bakhtiyar Engineer became a navar - Ervad Bakhtiyar Engineer aged 13 years on the 11th of January 2014.

Bakhtiyar has already participated in conducting a Navjote as well.

The parents now endeavour to make Bakhtiyar a martab soon.

What does the Farohar motif/symbol represent?

The farohar/fravahar motif as shown in the picture usually accompanies the portrait of a monarch depicted on Persian Achaemenid inscriptions, tomb façades and artefacts — all being royal settings. The Achaemenid dynasty ruled from around the 8th or 7th century BCE to 330 BCE. A similar and older motif has been found on a tomb in an area once part of Persia's sister nation, Media. When Achaemenid rule ended, so did the use of the winged motif — until, that is, about say two hundred years ago — when the farohar motif began to be adopted as a Zoroastrian symbol to symbolize the faith.

We have not found any record of an intervening use of the farohar between the end of the Achaemenid era and its modern adoption as a common Zoroastrian symbol.

Fravashi/Farohar

The Avestan word 'fravashi' has evolved to the modern farvard, faravahar/fravahar and farohar. The *Avesta* and Zoroastrian texts speak about the fravashi in two ways.

The first is as a spiritual component of all creation including human beings where it is a companion of the soul. The second is as a spiritual entity that survives the passing of a righteous person to the after-life. Here, it has the ability to become a beneficent spirit – a guardian angel if you will. In the first instance, the soul is a personal spiritual component while the fravashi is a universal component. The soul becomes good or bad depending on the choices made by its corporeal owner. The fravashi, however, carries asha, the laws of God, and is incorruptible. The soul can seek the assistance of the fravashi. While goodness is innate within us, associating with it is a matter of free will – of choice. Wisdom is the soul's path to uniting with the fravashi and it is in an ashavan, a righteous person, where the two are in harmony. Such an individual is divinely blest.

With this endowed faculty embedded within us, we do not need to seek divine assistance from without – we need to look deep within.

It appears that once united with the personal soul, the universal fravashi becomes personal.

Whatever you say

'Thoughtless words can wound as deeply as any sword, but wisely spoken words can heal.'

Get aware of what you are saying.

Is what you are saying empowering to you?...... and to others?

We all know how impressionable children can be. At an early age, the critical factor of the conscious mind is not completely formed, so a child tends to accept what is told to him/her. We often make the mistake of pointing out negative qualities in our child hoping that they will get aware of them and change. Get aware, they will; but if it is change you are looking for then start telling them otherwise. If you wish your child to be more responsible, *acknowledge* them each time they show a semblance of responsibility.

Don't ever call them irresponsible or they will believe it and **be** irresponsible.

An experiment was conducted with a group of school children. They were academically average performers but were told that they were being separated from the rest of the class because they had a very high level of intelligence. At the end of the year, these students performed dramatically well.

They say: 'If you believe you can't, you are right. If you believe you can, you can.'

And suggestions play an important role in what you believe of yourself.

This is where affirmations come in. When you repeat things to yourself, you start believing them to be true, which in turn makes you act differently. *Affirmations* are *suggestions to yourself*.

In the same manner, the phrases that we habitually use (so carelessly), also affect us, *mentally* and *physically*. Don't be surprised if you end up with a neck pain if you have been calling someone 'a pain in the neck'.

We use *metaphors* all the time to create a visual picture or a better impression of what we are thinking or trying to say.

"I feel like a fish out of water." Now, now. Aren't you exaggerating the discomfort.... just a wee bit?

Make a conscious decision, now, to use metaphors that empower you. One of my favourites is: 'We cannot direct the wind but we can adjust the sails.'

Your words spell your attitude. Your attitude creates your ability.

One says "Let me do it for you" while the other says "It's not my job". The Winner says: "It may be difficult but it's possible."

The Loser says: "It may be possible but it's too difficult."

Which do you choose to be?

Don't trust *Proverbs* – there is really no truth in them.

'Absence makes the heart grow fonder' VERSUS 'Out of sight, out of mind'

But proverbs and quotations are very impressive, so pick the ones that make you feel empowered.

How's this for a start: "Whatever you can do, or dream you can, begin it.

Boldness has genius, power and magic in it." – Goethe.

We can take away the power of our emotions by changing the word we use to describe our feelings.

Instead of saying: "I'm afraid this won't work"

we could say: "I am not very comfortable with the idea"

Instead of telling yourself how 'confused' you are, you could be 'curious.'

'Frustrated' could simply mean 'challenged'.

Instead of 'hating' something, say what you 'prefer'.

Not only can you reduce the bad feelings, by changing the words you use, but can also use the same process to *turbocharge* the positive feelings. Say you are feeling 'great' when you feel 'good'. And when you are feeling confident, tell yourself you are 'unstoppable'. 'Okay' can be 'Perfect' and 'No Problem' can become 'Happy to...'.

You can describe a relationship break-up as a 'breakdown' in your life or a 'breakthrough' for you. You decide: which is for you or against.

But it's not all only about us. What are we telling others that might be damaging to them? Would you like to be with someone who made you feel good about yourself or bad? Instead of telling others what they are doing wrong, you could tell them what they could do in the situation that might be beneficial to them. Encouragement, appreciation and direction; now that's empowering. And doesn't it also make you feel good about yourself?

Recognize the power of words. What you say creates an impression on yourself and your surroundings. Your word is your commitment.

There is one elementary truth,

The ignorance of which kills countless ideas and splendid plans:

That

The moment one definitely commits oneself,

Then providence moves too.

All sorts of things occur to help one

That would never otherwise have occurred.

A whole stream of events issues from the decision,

Raising in one's favour,

All manner of unforeseen incidents and meetings and material assistance

Which no man could have dreamt would have come his way.

So....beware of what you say......

The Universe might respond to you with: "Whatever you say.
